For 40 years, the SARA (Scanning, Analysis, Response and Assessment) model has proven to be an effective approach for law enforcement to solve problems that lead to higher violent crime in your community.

The SARA model encourages law enforcement agencies to work collaboratively with the community to successfully resolve problems.

- Scanning: Identifying persistent problems that cause harm and call for police attention.
- Analysis: Systematic studying of the causes or conditions that lead to a problem or enable it to persist.
- Response: Implementing measures based on your analysis that appear likely to reduce or eliminate the problem.
- Assessment: Evaluating the response to see if it worked as intended and whether the problem has been removed, reduced, or unintentionally aggravated.
